1940 The NGV purchased *Head of a man* (through the Felton Bequest)

from Lieutenant Colonel Victor Alexander Cazalet, MP for Cranbrook,

Kent and London

1999 The NGV established a provenance research project and was the first

Australian gallery to publish on its website the details of works that have incomplete provenance (history of ownership) during the years of

Nazi rule.

2006 The attribution (authorship) of *Head of a man* came under question by

international scholars. NGV sent the work to the Van Gogh Museum in Amsterdam, the leading institution for authentication of works by

Vincent Van Gogh, for expert appraisal.

2007 A comprehensive report by the Van Gogh Museum concluded that

Head of a man was not by Van Gogh. A summary of the report was

made publicly available.

Dec 2011 New research revealed that one of work's previous owners – known

previously as 'Collector S' – was a Richard Semmel who sold the work at auction in 1933. The provenance research website was updated.

Aug 2013 The NGV was contacted by a researcher from Facts and Files

Historical Research Institute Berlin (a provenance research

organisation), on behalf of the legal representative of the heirs of Mr Semmel, prompted by information viewed on the provenance research

website.

Dec 2013 The NGV received correspondence from the legal representative of

the heirs of Mr Semmel, outlining the background of Mr Semmel, the forced sale of the work, and requesting the return of the painting to its

rightful owners.

May 2014 Following comprehensive research and consultation the NGV

acknowledges the claimants as legitimate heirs and rightful owners of

Head of a man.
