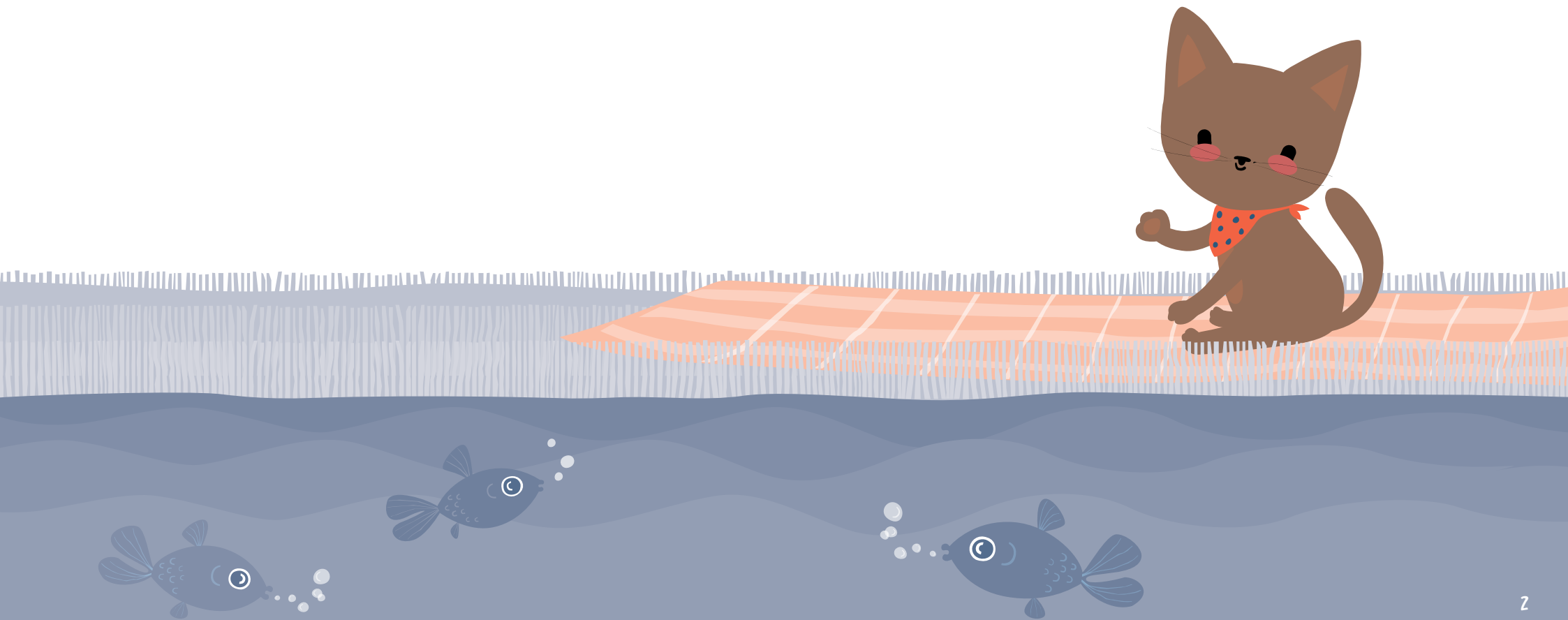
SPLISH, SPLASH!
